“ I am shocked and sorry to hear about Austin. I am another old school mate from Auburn. Austin and I lived in the same building, a house behind a house on West Glenn in Auburn. I lived for three school (59-60, 60-61, 61-62) years in one or the other of these rooming houses, so I do not remember exactly which year Austin and I were in the same house. But through the years I have told the same story about Austin. Austin studied much more than I did, but when he wanted a break, he would come by my room wanting me to go play snooker with him. He knew he could always twist my arm and get me to go. Austin was a very good snooker shooter. And if you do not know, snooker is a pool game, and pool was one of the few diversions we had in Auburn. I would always tell Austin ""you know you will beat me. you just want me to go so I will pay for your pool. How about I just give you a quarter and you play by yourself?"" “ Dear Mrs. Golson, I was sorry to read that Austin had passed away; I had wondered where he was and how he was doing. He and I were roommates at Auburn in the Spring Qtr. of 1959, I believe it was. He was in the first or second year of Chemistry or Chemical Engr. at that time, I believe. I am wondering if he had been in good health up until recently and when he retired. The pic of you folks looks like you might be in Hawaii; maybe for a retirement celebration. When we were roommates, I was completing my Junior Year and was a coop student in EE and working part time, as coops do, at Redstone Arsenal. I graduated in the Spring Qtr. of 1960 and spent my career working at Redstone, retiring in April 1994. I wish I could have visited with him, but didn't know that he was living so close by until I saw his Obituary in the Hville Times. When we were roommates he was working part time at a Funeral Home in Prattville, I believe it was, and one of his friends that was working at the Funeral Home, also part time, was either living in the same rooming house that Spring or moved into the same rooming house in the Fall of 1959.
